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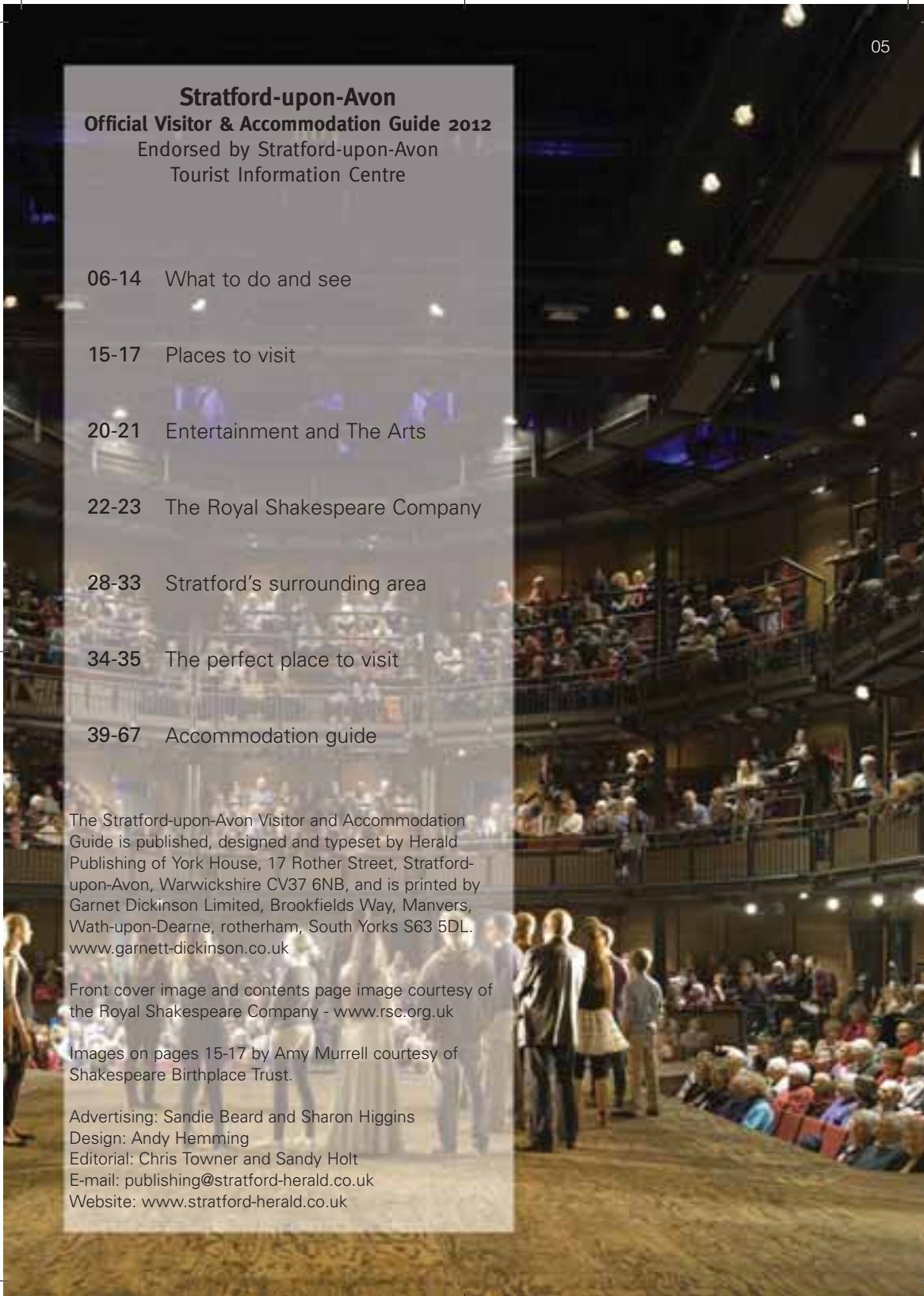
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What to do and see in Stratford

2012 will be another busy year

SET in beautiful Warwickshire countryside on the banks of the river that gives it its name, Stratford-upon-Avon is one of the most sought-after holiday and visitor destinations in the UK, mainly because it is the birthplace of the poet and playwright William Shakespeare.

The town is steeped in culture and history and not only offers a taste of 'olde' England and a kaleidoscope of interesting architecture, but also hosts a grand series of events and festivals for all of the family throughout the year.

Whether your interest lies with music, sport, eating or visiting places of interest, there is something for everyone—and of course a wealth of historic buildings linked to Shakespeare and theatres, mediaeval churches and buildings, parks and gardens and other entertainment spots.

This year the town's events diary kicks off with a selection of entertainment from pantomimes and theatre, to classical concerts and jazz, with some comedy nights, musicals and other shows thrown in.

There are many community and charity events throughout the year, but what the town is most proud of is that it is alive with festivals. These begin in the spring and include events celebrating literature, music, food and, of course, the river. You name it—the town has got it. This year the town will also host a season of events as part of the World Shakespeare Festival. The most significant of these are the Shakespeare Birthday Celebrations at the end of April. This event

sees dignitaries, Shakespeare experts, scholars, writers and theatre people gather to celebrate the famous playwright's birthday. Traditionally, there is a grand procession involving visitors, as well as local residents and schoolchildren, and the unfurling of flags representing Shakespeare's plays.

including morris and modern dancing, street entertainment, brass bands and great festivities and the procession ends with those taking part laying flowers on Shakespeare's grave in the town's beautiful Holy Trinity Church (pictured below), which is probably the most visited church in the country.

There is much activity going on during this

This year, the Birthday Celebrations will also mark the beginning of a whole host of plays and events as part of Olympic celebrations – namely the World Shakespeare Festival.

At the end of April the town plays host to the annual Stratford Literary Festival, which this year runs between 22nd and 28th April. If last year's event is anything to go by—it attracted such names as Arthur Smith, Baroness Shirley Williams, Celia Imrie, Patricia Routledge,

Colin Dexter and John Humphrys—this year's should be outstanding.

Continuing the literary theme, the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust will stage a Poetry Festival later in the summer. Now in its 59th year, this attracts national and international stars to perform themed evenings of verse celebrating Shakespeare and other poets, as well as local schoolchildren writing their own poems. There are also a number of

other literary and celebratory events organised by the trust throughout the year.

Each year the town's internationally acclaimed chamber orchestra, Orchestra of the Swan, also joins forces with outstanding international musicians to produce the Spring Sounds festival which takes place during the second May bank holiday weekend.

Other highlights in the spring include the Shakespeare Marathon, to be held on Sunday 29th April. It is a nationally recognised event and organised by Stratford Rotary Club.

At the end of May the town's Fringe Festival opens, this festival was only introduced two years ago and already it has established itself in the town's annual calendar. The event, which runs from 2nd until 10th June offers a vast array of entertainment ranging from drama, music, dance, comedy and art.

music and a spectacular display of visiting boats ranging from gondolas and coracles to barges and cruisers—some beautifully illuminated for a late night parade.

The summer also brings the Shakespeare Express steam train service to town—a step back in time where visitors can see the train's engine stoked at Stratford Railway station. This service runs from July until mid-September every Sunday between Stratford and Birmingham, and passengers get the opportunity to view

June sees the annual Lions' charity raft race and Stratford Boat Club regatta, which brings us onto the town's annual River Festival on 30th June and 1st July which offers boatloads of fun for all the family. There is also the annual Lion's Raft race around this time too.

The River Festival takes place on the banks and on the waters of the Avon and in the town's recreation ground. Attractions include craft fairs and food stalls, demonstrations and theatrical performances, live

Festival on the town's recreation ground in September which offers a host of entertainment, demonstrations, hundreds of stalls and fine foods and drinks to sample.

October sees Stratford stage the annual Stratford Music Festival, which is an eight-day event that brings in high profile musicians, singers and bands of varying genres to suit all tastes. Also in October, the annual Mop Fair rolls into town filling the streets with stalls and wild fairground rides.

The year wouldn't be complete without the perfect Christmas, and the town hosts a magical Christmas Festival which includes entertainment, late-night shopping on the four Thursdays prior to Christmas with themed markets and entertainment – and naturally a visit by Father Christmas. All of this coincides with a stunning display of festive lights.

Stratford's world famous historical properties and landmarks

OF course, Stratford is world-famous for being the birthplace of the playwright and poet William Shakespeare and his name lives on throughout the town. There are five houses linked to Shakespeare and his family and each offers a unique experience of the Stratford world into which the famous dramatist was born.

The properties, which are owned and

managed by the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust, are: the Birthplace, in Henley Street, where he was born and grew up; Anne Hathaway's Cottage, in Shottery, where Shakespeare courted his wife; Mary Arden's Farm, in Wilmcote, which was his mother's childhood home; Hall's Croft, in Old Town, where Shakespeare's daughter, Susanna, lived with her husband, Dr John Hall; and New Place, where Shakespeare spent his last years life.

These properties are open all year round and feature rare period furnishings and domestic items as well as being set in attractive gardens. Tradition has it that William Shakespeare was born on 23rd April 1564; died on the same day 52 years later. Copies of the appropriate records can be seen in the chancel of Holy Trinity Church, a beautiful building dating back 800 years.

The Shakespeare Centre, headquarters of the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust, also holds collection and archives relating to the Bard and the history of the town. There is also a series of literary and other events which take place in the building throughout the year.

But the town is not just about Shakespeare. There are many other attractions for families including the Stratford Butterfly Farm, Europe's largest, where you can enjoy some of the world's most spectacular and

colourful butterflies flying around you.

There is also the insect room and Arachnoland, wildlife video shows, children's adventure playground and a wildlife gift shop. There are several art galleries, a dedicated Christmas shop—open all year round

and to bring a little bit of magic and mystery the Creaky Cauldron, in Henley Street, offers not only magic potions but spooky entertainment as well as children's parties, the Museum of Wizardology and Imagiscarium and a Victorian tea garden as well as its own tourist information centre.

This is not the only unusual attraction in the town. For those who enjoy the mysterious, As well as a ghost walk and ghost cruise, there is the Falstaff Experience, labelled Stratford's most haunted building (and featured on the popular television programme of the same name). As you enter the museum in the 16th century Shrieve's House Barn,

you will learn some remarkable tales relating to the history of Stratford and England. The museum also has its own heady atmosphere, felt by many who pass through its labyrinth of theatrical settings.

Also set in the heart of the town is the beautiful Guild Chapel, dating from the 13th century, which was built for the Guild of the Holy Cross, which was later suppressed by Henry VIII.

And next door is the old guildhall, now part of King Edward VI Grammar School. It houses the schoolroom in which Shakespeare was thought to have been taught and the courtyard to the rear is where Shakespeare most likely saw his first theatrical performance. Sadly, these historic buildings are not usually open to the public, though they school has plans do so in the future and to build a heritage centre for visitors.

If that's not enough to keep you occupied, there is plenty of riverside walks, a guided town walk, sight-seeing buses, which tour the

town and connect all the Shakespeare properties, and river cruises, rowing boats and what is believed to be the last working chained ferry. Of an evening visitors can enjoy fine food on some of the cruisers or a themed night of entertainment.

With National Trust properties and stately homes on the doorstep—Charlecote Park,

Upton House, Baddesley Clinton, Packwood House, Ragley Hall and Coughton Court—the famous Warwick and Kenilworth castles, the award-winning art gallery at Compton Verney, the Heritage Motor Centre and Hatton Country World, what more could you want from a stay in Stratford-upon-Avon?



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Entertainment and the Arts in Stratford

STRATFORD-UPON-AVON has far more to offer its visitors than just Shakespeare, even though this plays a big part in the town's heritage.

For those with broader interests there is a whole host of alternative entertainment on offer, including live music, cinema, visitor attractions, a multitude of productions offered by the town's numerous amateur drama and singing groups and a vast array of fine pubs, restaurants, nightclubs and other entertainment spots.



For visitors into performing arts, this year the town's events diary is packed with entertainment. The town boasts a healthy collection of first-class amateur groups, which include Second Thoughts Drama Group, The Phoenix Players, Avonside Players, Stratford Gilbert & Sullivan Society, Stratford Musical Theatre Company, Consensus, Caramba, Tarantara and the Trinity Players, who in 2012 will be performing shows ranging from

pantomime (Phoenix Players are producing *Aladdin* at the end of January) to musicals and opera.

If theatre is not your cup of tea, Stratford Civic Hall, which is based in the heart of the town, plays host to a wide variety of events including tea dances, chamber and symphony orchestras, big bands, evenings with well-known celebrities, cat shows, art exhibitions and many other community and charity events.

The venue also provides the home of nationally renowned Orchestra of the Swan, which runs a season of popular and sometimes challenging themed concerts featuring some of the best musical soloists around. In fact, in February the orchestra plays host to international cellist Julian Lloyd Webber who will be performing Tchaikovsky, Shostakovich and Mozart.

As well as the Orchestra of the Swan there is a melody of orchestras, bands and choral

societies who perform regularly throughout the year at various venues across the town.

For those who prefer something a bit more contemporary, there are at least two music venues, Cox's Yard and The Chapel at No 1 Shakespeare Street which hosts local and national bands, tribute bands, comedy nights and often the odd blast from the pop or rock world's past. Stratford Jazz, a unique jazz club, also has a weekly slot at The Chapel.

The town's folk club is resident at the Embassy Club and has a series of fine artists on its books and often many of the town's pubs will stage live music—there really is music for all tastes.

For film-lovers Stratford Picturehouse is a must, with films ranging from the latest blockbusters to childrens movies and a host of special events for families during school holidays. The cinema also shows live satellite screenings of world premieres, including opera.

Stratford Butterfly Farm offers family fun, while for those wanting more of a haunting experience there are ghost walks around the town, the Creaky Cauldron exhibition and the Falstaff Experience in one of Stratford's most haunted houses – here you can meet psychics, mediums and (rumour has it) ghosts of the past.

There are many restaurants in Stratford and the surrounding area, catering for every taste from across the world ranging from traditional English cuisine to French, Italian, Thai, Chinese, Indian, Greek, Mediterranean, Indonesian and speciality fish restaurants. You name it, the town has got it—even restaurant cruises along the river. But if you are looking for a less formal place to eat the town boasts many pubs, cafés

and bistros, most of which offer lunchtime and evening meals and quite a few are open all day, some serving pre-theatre and post-theatre menus.



There are simply loads of pubs in Stratford town centre to enjoy a drink, from the well-known pub chains to the privately owned establishments, from the Dirty Duck, in Waterside, where actors from the Royal Shakespeare Company often sup, or if they are on stage you take a look at the

many autographed photos, to the only thatched pub in town, the Old Thatch Tavern.

Quite a collection of these pubs have recently undergone refurbishment to offer even better facilities to visitors and holiday makers. The town also has a fine selection of hotels and guest houses with plenty of facilities to help make it easier to lengthen your stay.

The Royal Shakespeare Company

LAST year was a significant year for the Royal Shakespeare Company as it celebrated not only its 50th birthday, but the reopening of its newly transformed Royal Shakespeare and Swan Theatres. This year is no less significant as the world's most famous theatre company leads the way again, this time producing the World Shakespeare Festival in collaboration with leading UK and international arts organisations.

It runs from 23rd April to November and forms part of London 2012 Festival, which is the culmination of the Cultural Olympiad, bringing leading artists from all over the world together in a UK-wide festival this summer. In Stratford alone, there will be a full summer season of around 20 productions and exhibitions celebrating the famous playwright—William Shakespeare. But before this all starts there is still an exciting programme of

productions for visitors to the town to enjoy—as well as the theatre's popular tourist features which include a 36 metre high tower and viewing platform to see the town's historic landmarks, backstage tours, new exhibition spaces, the rooftop restaurant and riverside café and terrace and the restored 1930s features and improved public areas.

At the beginning of January audiences will get the chance to see the last few performances of the swashbuckling 2011-12 winter family show, *The Heart of Robin Hood*. This production is the first large-scale family show in the new Royal Shakespeare Theatre (RST). It is written by RSC Associate Director David Farr and directed by Gisli Örn Gardarsson, co-founder of Iceland's Vesturport Theatre and tells the tale of the notorious Robin Hood and his band of outlaws, who rob from the rich, but fail to share with the poor.

The Taming of the Shrew opens on the RST stage on 19th January until 18th February before embarking on a six-week national UK tour. Lucy Bailey directs this sometimes controversial romantic comedy, exploring love and sexual politics through Petruchio's attempts to tame Katharina to a submissive life of domesticity. Meanwhile, in the Swan Theatre, award-winning playwright David Edgar's play *Written on the Heart* runs until 10th March. This is a powerful examination of the story behind the King James Bible, which celebrated its 400th anniversary last year. The play explores the legacy of the earliest translators who died for their wish to see a ploughboy read the word of God and the dilemma of Lancelot Andrewes, King James's leading translator, as he confronts the betrayal of his youthful religious ideals for the sake of preferment and peace in a divided society. RSC chief associate, Greg Doran, directs.

Measure for Measure is RSC associate director Roxana Silbert's first Shakespeare production for the RSC and it will run in repertoire with *Written on the Heart* also until March. In this darkly

fascinating tale which puts moral and religious double standards on trial, Deputy Angelo is given free reign over Vienna and launches a crusade against loose morals, but makes an indecent proposal of his own when a condemned man's sister pleads for a pardon.

The Heresy of Love completes the Swan season for the early part of the year. Nancy Meckler directs this premiere of Helen Edmundson's new play, which is inspired by the life of Sor Juana Ines de la Cruz, the writer of *House of Desires*, which Nancy directed as part of the RSC's Spanish Golden Age season in 2004.

Finally, *Song of Songs* – inspired by the rich and erotic verse of Song of Solomon in the King James Bible and devised by RSC head of movement Struan Leslie, this piece will be performed by the RSC ensemble on the Swan Theatre stage for three performances only in February.

Then on 23rd April, Shakespeare's birthday, the festival fun begins. There will be productions and exhibitions galore ranging from RSC productions to works from Iraq, Brazil, the US and Russia, showcasing some of the world's most exciting artists. Highlights include 'What Country friends is This?' – a unique trilogy to celebrate the World Shakespeare Festival; *The Comedy of Errors*, directed by Amir Nizar Zuabi, founder of the Palestinian theatre company, ShiberHur; *Twelfth Night*, directed by David Farr, RSC associate director; *The Tempest* also directed by Mr Farr; *Nations at War* a season of RSC work in the Swan Theatre exploring the struggle for absolute power and the right to lead a nation, which includes *King John*, *Richard III* and *A Soldier In Every Son* – An

Aztec Trilogy by Luis Mario Moncada, which is a National Theatre of Mexico/RSC co-production; *Romeo and Juliet in Baghdad*, adapted by Monadhil Daood (an Iraqi Theatre Company production); *Two Roses for Richard III*, A Companhia Bufomecanica Production in association with the RSC; *Julius Caesar* directed by RSC chief associate director, Gregory Doran; *In A Pickle* by Tim Webb An Oily Cart/RSC co-production; *I, Cinna* written and directed by Tim Crouch; *Much Ado About Nothing*, directed by Iqbal Khan; *Troilus and Cressida* The Wooster Group/RSC co-production; *A Midsummer Night's Dream (As You Like It)*, A

Chekhov International Theatre Festival/Dmitry Krymov's Laboratory/School of Dramatic Art Theatre production and *A Tender Thing* (after Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*), by Ben Power and directed by Helena Kaut-Howson.

Exhibitions include Living Walls presented by Squidsoup which will see the walls of the RST

coming alive with living wallpapers made of animated texts and quotes from Shakespearean characters and The Stories of Shakespeare—a fresh view of the stories in Shakespeare's plays in an exhibition through the RST and the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust properties in Stratford. There will also be a programme of amateur company productions, including performances from local groups, as part of an Open Stages project.

Alcester

A delightful Roman market town

Alcester is a delightful Roman market town only seven miles west of Stratford-upon-Avon, situated on the River Arrow and well worth a visit.

The high street has many individual retailers on both sides of the street offering a variety of wares and goods and is overlooked by the lovely St Nicholas' Church with its 14th century tower and just behind that is the 17th century Town Hall.

In Globe House you will get all kinds of help and information about the town, including the heritage trail and a display of artefacts and treasure found in and around Roman Alcester. At the rear

of Globe House there is a chance to sit quietly at the recently completed Firefighters Memorial Garden, which you enter through a beautiful oak

lych gate, made using timber from the local Ragley Estate.

There is a variety of places to stay if looking for accommodation and a good selection of traditional pubs, coaching inns, cafés and restaurants.

It would be no surprise to arrive in Alcester and find them hosting one of the many annual events. There is a Town Criers competition in April, a Folk Festival in June, a Food Festival offering a taste of the district and surrounding areas, followed by the annual themed street market, the Mop fair in October, and a St Nicholas Night in December. Plus arts festivals and parades at other times.

There are some picturesque walks

in and around Alcester including the nearby historic houses of Ragley Hall, home to the Marquess and Marchioness of Hertford and Coughton Court, the home of the Throckmorton Family, well known for its links with the gunpowder plot!



Bidford-on-Avon

A beautiful riverside village

Bidford-on-Avon is a village seven miles from Stratford-upon-Avon and is right on the water's edge of the River Avon. There lies a

Henley-in-Arden

Henley-in-Arden is a picturesque medieval town, seven miles to the north of Stratford-upon-Avon. You drive straight through it on the main route from Stratford-upon-Avon to Birmingham.

The high street is a mile long and is home to just about everything, from an art gallery showing ceramics, painting and sculpture, to a cosmopolitan choice of restaurants, cafés and pubs to please anyone's taste. Not to be missed - the perfect place to stop off any day of the week and to treat yourself - is the famous Henley Ice Cream, which has been in the town for many decades.

Henley-In-Arden also boasts a good selection of designer shops. This all adds to the ideal place for visitors to spend a little time while visiting Stratford-upon-Avon.

For those with an interest in history it is pleasing that Henley-In-Arden can trace back almost 1,000 years. In the centre of the town there is the old market place which boasts the remains of the

15th century market cross, built of local stone and is one of only a few still existing in Warwickshire. There are over 150 buildings listed as being of special architectural or historic interest, including the

Guild Hall, a timber framed building with many of the original timbers remaining, this is to the north side of St John's Church.

The Heritage Centre can be found in Joseph Hardy House, which is understood to be a rare architectural building dating back to 1345. The Heritage Centre and the Guild Hall are open during the summer season, with free entry.



Shipston-on-Stour

The one and only "Sheep-wash Town"

The market town of Shipston-on-Stour is 11 miles south of Stratford-upon-Avon, on the River Stour, and on the edge of the beautiful Cotswolds. Shipston was well known for many years, long ago, as "Sheep-wash Town", as the sheep used to be washed in the river in early summer. As well as its wool trade, two of the main occupations were spinning and weaving. The Sheldon tapestries in the nearby hamlet of Barcheston are a fine example of the history of tapestry making, decorated with flowers and mythological motifs, highlighted with silk.

Due to its location Shipston was also well known for its coaching inns, some of which can be found in the town today, alongside a good selection of cafés, pubs, restaurants and accommodation. There is an extensive selection of independent retailers who

offer something for everyone, so it seems an excellent idea that the town boasts its own loyalty card.

St Edmunds Church has a clock tower dating from the 15th century, the remainder was built in 1855.

One of the annual events to look out for in the summer, over a two week period, is the Shipston Proms Music Festival, which caters for all tastes, classical, blues, jazz, rock and folk, with performers being both local and world renowned artists.

Southam

A local market town

The Market town of Southam is approximately 19 miles to the east of Stratford-upon-Avon and can trace its history back to the Anglo-Saxon times. The village spreads along both sides of the main street, with many historic buildings and traditional shops, including the chemist shop, a half timbered building which once was the manor house of Southam. It is reported King Charles I stayed here during the civil war. The Olde Mint public house, built in the 15th century, was used by the town to mint its own currency and was later used by King Charles I to make new coins to pay his soldiers.

Although now a residential

property, the Craven Arms Hotel was formerly the main coaching inn with stabling for up to 80 horses. It is believed that Southam became an important stop on the coaching roads between London, Liverpool, Leicester, Birmingham, Oxford, and probably many more places.

It is worth using the town trail to visit places of interest such as the Holy Well, which dates back more than a thousand years and is

understood to have been used by monks from nearby Stoneythorpe. The well has a constant flow of natural water from a nearby spring. The water is always cold and it has been said to have healing properties, particularly for eye disease.

The modern day Southam has a weekly market on a Tuesday in Wood Street. The town still holds the traditional annual Mop fair each October which dates

back to the 14th Century. There is a variety of places to eat and drink within the town to suit all tastes and budgets.
